### Floor

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#### First Words

Watch the language learning process unfold, from babbling babies to talkative toddlers. This gallery showcases how babies learn their first language and gives visitors a glimpse of what it looks like to grow up bilingual.

#### Where Do Words Come From?

The 22-foot-tall wall of words speaks for itself — literally! Our talking word wall shares the history of the English language. Choose "burrito" to learn about how Spanish words have influenced the English we use today.

#### The Spoken World

Dive headfirst into the awe-inspiring diversity of languages by meeting speakers from several Spanish-speaking locales. Let them introduce you to what's unique about their native language, featuring César, a Spanish speaker from Venezuela and Elva, a Quechua speaker from Peru.

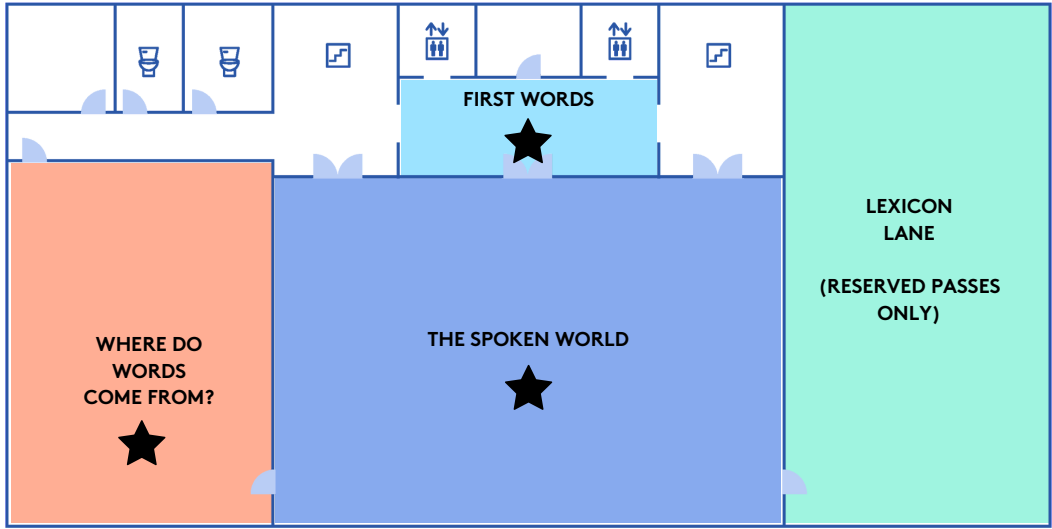

### Did You Know?

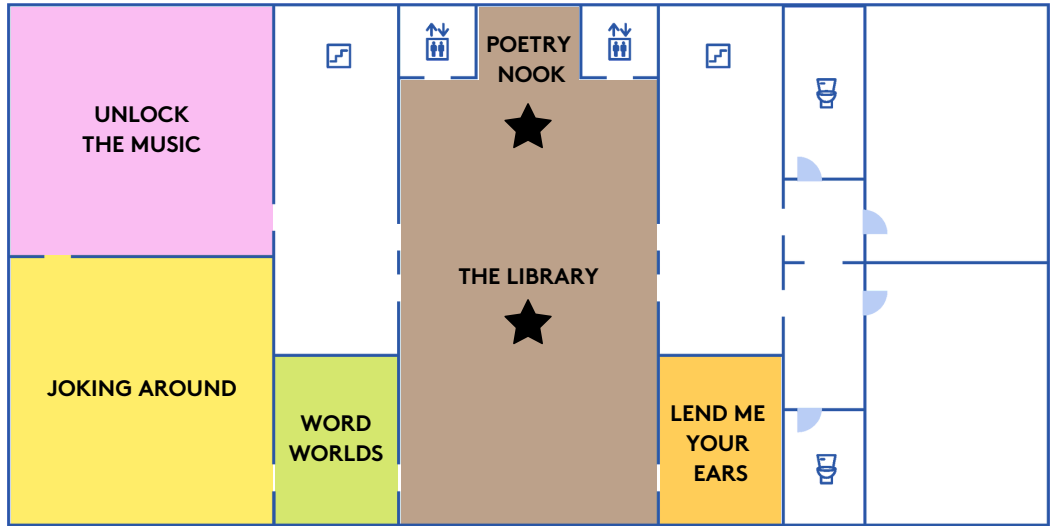
